## FAIR AND EFFECTIVE PRACTICES IN JURY SYSTEM MANAGEMENT

In many courts, jury operations are an essential, but relatively minor, trial support unit that runs mostly beneath the radar of busy court administrators. What many administrators fail to realize is that poor performance in jury operations can cost courts tens of thousands of dollars each year in unnecessary expenses while simultaneously undermining the ability of the court to guarantee a jury pool that reflects a fair cross section of the community. Citizens who experience poor operational performance while serving as prospective jurors also take home negative impressions of the court, undermining public trust and confidence in the justice system.
